Before a withdrawal from a college course is approved, it’s CHS policy for students to complete the steps below to show a good faith effort that everything possible has been tried to be successful in that class.

1. Email the professor of the class. *-Explain that you are considering withdrawing from the course and ask for suggestions on how you can be more successful.*
2. Attend at least 3 TLCC tutoring sessions for core academic courses.
3. Parent contact and a meeting scheduled with Mrs. Black and Mrs. Allen
4. Complete Polk State’s Student Request for Withdrawal form

*Seniors it is recommended that you contact the admissions offices of the colleges you are interested in before withdrawing to find out their policy regarding withdrawals.

*Withdrawals will not be approved if the grade in the course is not a D or F.
