I. Introduction

In compliance with the *Safe and Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act of 1989* (Public Law 101-226), Polk State College must affirm that it has established and executed a program to deter the unlawful possession, usage, and distribution of illicit substances and the misuse of alcohol among its student and employee population. This biennial assessment evaluates the extent and efficacy of the College's prevention initiatives to ensure a comprehensive approach and adherence to statutory requirements.

The program at Polk State College encompasses the following components:

- Annual dissemination of pertinent information to all employees and students enrolled in academic-credit courses (i.e., excluding Continuing Education Units (CEUs). The information provided includes:
 - Clearly defined standards of behavior and express prohibition of the unlawful possession, use, or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol on College premises or during any College-related activities.
 - Explanation of the legal consequences local, state, and federal statutes for violations involving illicit substances and alcohol.
- Sessions and materials that outline the health hazards associated with the consumption of illicit drugs and alcohol abuse.
- An overview of the available drug and alcohol counseling, treatment, rehabilitation, and reentry programs accessible to both employees and students.
- A firm declaration that the College imposes disciplinary measures consistent with applicable laws. The College details potential sanctions ranging from expulsion or termination to legal prosecution for breaches of mandated standards.

The College provides periodic review of its program, to:

- Assess the efficacy of existing programs and institute necessary modifications for improvement.
- Ensure uniform enforcement of disciplinary actions across all instances.

By fulfilling these obligations, Polk State College remains committed to fostering a safe and healthy environment that is conducive to learning while upholding legal and ethical standards regarding substance-abuse prevention and control.

II. Description of the College's Alcohol and Other Drug (AOD) Programming

Polk State College offers an alcohol and substance abuse program designed to raise awareness about College policies governing alcohol and drug use. Polk State's current alcohol and other drug prevention activities are comprised of the following ongoing programming, events, opportunities, sessions, publications, and interventions:

A. Academic and Educational Efforts

Through students' academic activities, they are provided with information in:

- **HLP 1081: *Wellness Concepts***: This course, which has broad enrollment, includes a major unit on substance abuse, decision-making, and the health consequences of alcohol and drug misuse.
- **New Student Orientation**: This session provides a formal overview of the College's AOD policies, student requirements and expectations, and available resources for assistance.

B. Student Engagement and Awareness Opportunities

The Student Activities and Leadership Office (SALO), which oversees the Student Government Associations, clubs, organizations, and activities, offers the following:

- Regular alcohol and drug awareness events are provided during the year.
- SALO partners with Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD), the Florida Department of Transportation, and My Brother's Keeper (for at risk and homeless students) to provide information and resources.
- There is a speaker series on addiction, recovery, and prevention.

C. Counseling and Support Services

The College offers the BayCare Student Assistance Program, which provides:

- Confidential counseling, crisis support, and assessment and referrals for students.
- Campus-based counseling at the Lakeland and Winter Haven campuses.

D. Campus Safety and Policy Compliance

The College's Public Safety and Security divisions offer:

- Educational outreach during campus events.
- Collaboration on policy enforcement with the Student Services Department.
- Law enforcement presence and support (as needed) for the overall College environment.

E. Athletics Department Policies

The College's Intercollegiate Athletics Department provides:

- Mandatory, random drug testing.
- Annual education sessions and materials for student-athletes.
- Clear expectations and consequences related to substance use both in and out of season.

F. Institutional Communications

Polk State also provides college-wide communications regarding institutional policies and resources.

- An annual campus-wide email notice is sent to all students and employees regarding the College’s AOD policies.
- The College provides AOD-related information in the *Annual Security Report* published on its [website](#).
- The College’s policies related to alcohol and other drug use are easily accessible through the *Polk State Catalog/Student Handbook* and the College’s [website](#).

III. Assessment of Program Effectiveness

Overall, Polk State’s Alcohol and Other Drug (AOD) prevention efforts have been determined to be effective based on low incident rates, use of ongoing programming, accessibility of counseling services, and consistent application of conduct policies across campuses. Evidence of effectiveness includes:

- Zero *Clery*-related arrests or referrals for alcohol or drugs during Academic Years 2024–2026.
- Continued student utilization of the BayCare services provided.
- Consistent engagement in SALO programming across the College’s main campuses.
- Standardization of the College’s conduct procedures across its locations.

Policy Inventory

The following key policies were reviewed for clarity and enforceability:

- District Board of Trustees (DBOT) Rule 4.01: *Code of Conduct for Students and Student Organizations*
- District Board of Trustees (DBOT) Rule 4.33: *Hazing*
- DBOT Rule 2.25: *Drug-Free Workplace*
- Polk State College Procedure 1031: *Intercollegiate Athletics Drug and Alcohol Testing*
- The College’s AOD statements in the *Annual Security Report*.

These policies were reviewed for consistent application across student populations, including first-year students, dual-enrollment students, student-athletes, and general students.

The College’s Drug-Free Policy

Because the likelihood of success is so dramatically reduced for students using illegal drugs, Polk State College is determined to have drug-free campuses. Illegal use of drugs or alcohol is not tolerated on any Polk State College campus or at any College-sponsored event off campus as indicated by [DBOT Rule 4.01](#): *Code of Conduct for Students and Student Organizations* and [DBOT Rule 2.25](#): *Drug-Free Workplace*. Certain limited-admission programs (e.g., Nursing Program, healthcare programs) have additional policies regarding the use of drugs and alcohol which are disseminated via program-specific handbooks, media, and student orientation sessions.

Various opportunities exist at Polk State College to educate students about the realities of drug and alcohol abuse, starting with new Student Orientation. Additionally, a major unit in the HLP

1081: *Wellness Concepts* course covers substance abuse. Special seminars, workshops, and discussion opportunities are also scheduled and advertised throughout the campuses and via the College's social media.

Polk State College requires all applicants for admission to commit to obeying the law and refraining from illegal drug and alcohol activity on campuses and at all College events.

Any student who illegally uses drugs or alcohol, or who sells or manufactures legal or illegal drugs on any of the College's campuses or centers, or at a College-sponsored event off campus, is subject to disciplinary actions, including suspension or expulsion. Additionally, the College refers any individual who engages in illegal drug, controlled substance, or alcohol activity on the College's campuses or centers (or at College events) to law enforcement for prosecution.

The College reserves the right to investigate reports of drug use or conviction. Any student who is found to have neglected this requirement is subject to disciplinary action up to and including expulsion.

A student who is suspended or expelled due to drug-related offenses may be granted readmission only if he or she provides proof of being drug free (or documentation of drug rehabilitation). The Associate Vice President of Student Services reviews the proof provided and makes a decision regarding readmission.

Information about student-related policies and procedures can be found on the [Polk State website](#) and within the [Polk State College Catalog/Student Handbook](#), as well as within the specific documents listed below.

- **DBOT Rule 4.01: Code of Conduct for Students and Student Organizations**
[District Board of Trustees \(DBOT\) Rule 4.01](#) was adopted in December of 1974 and most recently updated in 2024. It states that:
- *Use, possession of, or distribution of alcohol beverages on or off campus or at any College event (i.e., regardless of the age of the student) is prohibited.*
- **Polk State College Procedure 1031: Intercollegiate Athletics Drug and Alcohol Testing**
Polk State adopted its revision of [Procedure 1031](#) in February 2017, stating that Polk State College promotes a drug-free environment for students, staff, and visitors. The Intercollegiate Athletic Program provides extracurricular activities for students in a drug- and alcohol-free environment. A student-athlete is not permitted to use illegal or un-prescribed drugs, or to abuse alcohol during or after a team's competitive season. Abuse of prescribed medications is also not permitted. In order to be eligible to participate in the Intercollegiate Athletics Program, each student-athlete must consent to random drug testing at any time selected during the Academic Year. Also, any student-athlete or sport-specific team may be subjected to mandatory drug testing at any time during the

Academic Year. Disclosure of drug testing is listed on the *Polk State College Drug Consent Form* signed by the student-athlete.

- **DBOT Rule 2.25: Drug-Free Workplace**

The District Board of Trustees has directed the President, via [Rule 2.25](#), to establish a program concerning drug prevention and to direct the establishment of a drug-prevention program for College students and employees that, at a minimum, meets the requirements of the *Safe and Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act Amendments of 1989* (Public Law 101-226). The Drug-Free Workplace Program information must be included in the Polk State College employee handbooks.

IV. The College's Alcohol and Other Drug (AOD) Program Goals and Outcomes

A. Program Goals

Via its institutional programming, Polk State College seeks to:

- Reduce high-risk alcohol and drug use among students.
- Increase awareness of the health risks and legal consequences of alcohol and drug use.
- Ensure consistent enforcement of policies across all student groups.
- Maintain accessible counseling and referral services.

B. Evidence of Goal Achievement

The following indicate the overall success of the College's programs, activities, and services:

- No alcohol- or drug-related arrests or referrals within the *Clery Act* data in the *Annual Security Report* for Academic Years 2024–2026.
- Ongoing student engagement in the Student Activities and Leadership Office (SALO) programming regarding prevention of alcohol and drug use.
- Continued availability and use of BayCare counseling services.
- Use of standardized student conduct procedures across all campuses.

C. Program Strengths and Challenges

1. Strengths

- Strong leadership and support from the Student Services Department.
- Collaboration with and presence of security and law enforcement personnel on College campuses.
- Clearly written AOD policies.
- Centralized enforcement procedures.
- Accessible on-campus counseling services.
- Active student engagement through the SALO.

2. Challenges

- Limited targeted programming for dual-enrollment students.
- A need for better tracking of counseling outcomes.
- A need for more faculty training regarding early warning signs of substance misuse.

3. Recommendations for 2026-2028

- Expand alcohol and drug awareness programming for dual-enrollment students.
- Develop methods to assess utilization and outcomes of counseling referrals while maintaining confidentiality.
- Increase faculty and staff training regarding identification and referral of students exhibiting signs of substance misuse.
- Continue annual review of AOD policies and prevention programming.
- Explore additional student engagement opportunities focused on prevention, wellness, and recovery support.

V. Environmental Strategies

Polk State's prevention approach includes educational strategies (courses and workshops), individual support strategies (counseling), and institutional strategies (clear policies, consistent enforcement, and collaboration with community partners such as MADD and local law enforcement).

VI. Resources Available

A. BayCare Student Assistance Program

The College contracts with BayCare's Student Assistance Program to provide help with the following areas: Stress and Anxiety; Depression; Anger Management; Relationship Issues; Work, School, and Life Balance; Alcohol and Drug Use; and other life and behavioral issues that can drive or introduce substance abuse. For information about these services or to schedule an appointment, a student can call the toll-free, confidential helpline available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year (1.800.878.5470). Credentialed counselors are on the Lakeland and Winter Haven campuses for limited hours each week. The counselor on the Winter Haven Campus is in room WAD 159. The counselor on the Lakeland Campus is in room LTB 1274. Information about these services is also published on the College's website on the [*BayCare Student Assistance webpage*](#).

B. Student Activities

The Student Activities and Leadership Office (SALO) focuses on student engagement on all campuses to help facilitate a holistic approach to student immersion in the college experience. SALO provides activities regarding alcohol and drug awareness via partnerships with MADD (Mothers Against Drunk Driving), the Department of Transportation, and other local organizations.

The College also offers the My Brother's Keeper initiative on the Winter Haven Campus. This initiative, which provides food, personal hygiene, and short-term financial assistance for those experiencing barriers to education, is another resource that supports students in making positive choices for a stable and healthy future. The My Brother's Keeper program also brings in speakers to talk about drug and alcohol addiction and provides information on local services that are available.

Distribution of Information to Employees and Students:

Every employee and student are sent an email notification to review Polk State College's federal and state regulations concerning alcohol and drug usage. The full text of the College's alcohol and drug policies are available on the College website and upon request from the Associate Vice President of Student Services and the Interim Associate Vice President of Human Resources. Additionally, new students are briefed on the College's policies during orientation. They can access this information through the online [Polk State College Catalog/ Student Handbook](#), which outlines the prohibition of illegal alcohol consumption, as well as drug possession, use, or sale. The Catalog also delineates state and federal penalties and provides resources for assistance. This information is also accessible on the [College's website](#) through the specific governing rules and procedures.

Each year, every student and employee are emailed a copy of the link to the [Annual Security Report](#), last sent September 30, 2025, which includes a statement regarding the College's

drug and alcohol policies along with educational materials on substance abuse. Hard copies of this report are distributed across all campuses. This Report is also published on the College's website via the [Public Safety & Security](#) webpage.

Upon hiring, Polk State College's Human Resources Department furnishes each new employee with notification of the College's policy statement on alcohol and drug usage.

VIII. Federal Compliance

Polk State College affirms its adoption and execution of a comprehensive program aimed at deterring the unlawful possession, consumption, and distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol by students and employees on campus premises or during any campus-related endeavors. Pursuant to this goal, the College has:

- Formulated a comprehensive written policy concerning alcohol and other drug usage.
- Instituted a systematic procedure to disseminate the policy to all students, faculty, and staff members.
- Provided detailed information regarding the health hazards linked with alcohol abuse and the consumption of illicit drugs.
- Articulated federal, state, and local penalties for the unlawful possession or distribution of illicit substances and alcohol, and established and executed on-campus drug and alcohol programs.
- Instituted a mechanism to provide disciplinary actions for students and employees found to be in violation of the College's policies.
- Conducted a biennial evaluation to assess the effectiveness of the College's drug and alcohol program in furtherance of its continued success.

CAMPUS SAFETY
The Polk State College Campus Security Unit is committed to providing a safe and secure environment for students, faculty, staff, and visitors.



Critical to ensuring the safety and security of Polk State's more than 11,000 students and employees are the Campus Security Unit's partnerships with local law enforcement agencies. Through these partnerships, the Campus Security Unit can provide crime prevention measures and swift responses to incidents both on campus and in surrounding neighborhoods.

Also critical for campus safety is the involvement of students, employees and campus visitors. In order for a crime to occur, perpetrators must have the ability and opportunity to commit a crime. Individuals can help remove opportunities for crimes to occur and maximize campus safety by following a few simple guidelines. Being safe can sometimes require a bit of inconvenience, but it is important to plan ahead and make safety a priority.

PRACTICE PERSONAL SAFETY:

- Program the contact number for Campus Security into your cellphone.
- Be alert and aware of your surroundings.
- Trust your instincts when something feels wrong.
- Report suspicious, odd, or dangerous behavior.
- Keep doors and windows locked at all times.
- Do not leave belongings unattended.
- Protect access and security codes.
- Do not hand out contact information to strangers.
- Be a good friend and remain watchful for others.
- Tell someone where you are going and when you will return.
- Travel in groups after dark.
- Never offer rides to strangers.
- Don't drink and drive; designate a driver for safety.
- Leave if a party gets crazy.
- Never drink alone with someone you do not know.
- Do not take a ride with someone who is under the influence of alcohol or any other intoxicant.

CRIME STATISTICS:

Polk State College is committed to ensuring that students, employees, and community members have a safe and pleasant experience while at any Polk State campus or location. The Polk State Annual Security Report contains information regarding campus safety and security in compliance with the Jeanne Clery Act, a federal law that requires colleges and universities to disclose information about crime on and around their campuses. To view the complete Polk State Annual Security Report, individuals may visit polk.edu/public-safety-security

CLERY ACT SUMMARY:

- Colleges must publish an annual report disclosing campus security policies and three years' worth of selected crime statistics.
- Colleges must make timely warnings to the campus community about crimes that pose an ongoing threat to students and employees.
- Each institution with a police or security department must have a public crime log.
- The U.S. Department of Education collects and disseminates campus crime statistics.
- Campus sexual assault victims are provided certain basic rights.

PREPARATION FOR EMERGENCIES:

Polk State College Alert will send messages to registered wireless devices and/or email addresses.

In some cases, face-to-face communication may be used to notify individuals about an emergency on campus. The Polk State web page and social media accounts will also be used for notification purposes.

- **Emergency Notification:** This is issued with safety instructions if an immediate danger (e.g., active shooter) is present on campus.
- **Timely Warning:** This is a cautionary alert provided with specific safety instructions in the event that a potential or general threat exists (e.g., if a sexual assault occurs on campus).
- **Evacuation:** This instructs individuals to leave a location immediately, typically in response to a fire or hazardous materials incident.
- **Heightened Security:** During a Heightened Security alert, the building perimeters are secured. Members of the Campus Security Team (including deputies and contracted security staff) control the buildings. Classes and College business continue; however, movement between and within buildings is restricted.
- **Lackdowns:** This alert indicates that individuals should barricade themselves inside a building or room until further notice.

Individuals should make sure their contact information on file with the College is up-to-date. Cellphones are often the best way to communicate in an emergency, so individuals are encouraged to make sure this information is current.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES:

Under state law, no one under the age of 21 may purchase, possess, or consume alcoholic beverages. Consumption of alcohol is forbidden in all public and common areas of campus. Polk State requires that a special permit be obtained for the consumption of alcohol on campus; this permit is issued at the discretion of the president. Individuals found to be in violation are subject to the provisions of state law, Polk State policy, and the Student Code of Conduct.

ILLEGAL DRUGS:

Under state law, Polk State students and employees are not permitted to be under the influence of, or possess, manufacture, distribute, or sell illicit drugs while at Polk State-sponsored or approved events, on Polk State property, or in buildings used by the College for its educational or recreational programs. Students and employees found to be in violation are subject to arrest, conviction may result in probation, fines, and imprisonment. Students are also subject to disciplinary action according to the Student Code of Conduct.

WEAPONS:

The possession or use of a lethal weapon on Polk State's premises is strictly prohibited. Lethal weapons include, but are not limited to, firearms, ammunition, explosives, and other dangerous devices. Any person found in violation is subject to the provisions of state law, Polk State policy, and the Student Code of Conduct.

College rules and policies regarding conduct

exist for the benefit and safety of the campus community. They are strictly enforced. All Polk State College policies and regulations are detailed in the Student Handbook, available at catalog.polk.edu

REPORTING CRIMES AND EMERGENCIES:

Crimes, incidents, safety concerns, and other emergencies on campus can be reported directly to the Campus Security Office by dialing extension 5059 from any Polk State campus telephone, or 863.297.1059 from off-campus phones.

Students, employees, and visitors are encouraged to report all suspicious activities and persons observed on campus. Such calls should be made promptly to improve the ability of the Campus Security Office to investigate the situation, apprehend suspects, and prevent potential crimes. Upon receipt of a call, security officers respond immediately to the site of the emergency. All incidents are investigated and the office files a report.

The Polk State College [2023-2024 Annual Security Report](#) is now available. This report is required by federal law and contains policy statements and crime statistics for the College. The policy statements address the College's policies, procedures and programs concerning safety and security. Three years' worth of statistics are included for certain types of crimes that were reported to have occurred on campus; in off-campus buildings or in properties owned or controlled by the school; and on public property within or immediately adjacent to the campus.
