Sometimes we tend to assume that learning is an automatic, inevitable outcome of good teaching skills and we only focus on the development of those skills. Maybe, we should consider our students' learning skills.

That might include:

- 1) Getting to know your students through the use of learning style surveys or inventories
- 2) Understanding that students process information very differently
- 3) Varying teaching methods as often as possible (using technology, visuals, tactile objects)
- 4) Allowing students time to process and share information with a peer or group
- 5) Offering variety in assignment choices (written/oral, paper/project, etc.)
- 6) Encouraging students to reflect on study strategies to find what works best
